

KEESLER

After a week of lectures at the Twentieth NCR Training Department Headquarters in Gulfport, two additional weeks of training follow at Keesler Air Base where the material covered in the lectures is put into practice.

The first of the two weeks is spent on the rifle range. Here along with the hours of snapping in, listening to instructions, pulling target butts, and policing up the brass, one also acquaints himself with his M16 rifle and fires for qualification. The words "With an empty magazine and one round, lock and load!" ring on in one's ears for weeks to follow.

The second week provides far more diverse entertainment. It is at this time when the finer points of defensive warfare are taught. An endurance course sharpens the eye for trip flares and booby traps as well as acquaint the trainee with the niceties of swamp wading. Scavenger hunts, both night and day, serve to familiarize Seabees with a means of going places without becoming lost. The grand finale, however, is an all-night defensive perimeter exercise which teaches, if nothing else, to shoot first and ask questions later.





Lejeune



The Battalion spent most of the month of January, 1968 at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina for additional military training. At Lejeune the aim of the training was two fold. One aspect was to acquaint the members of the battalion with weapons such as the M-60 machine gun, M-79 grenade launcher, 3.5 rocket launcher, and 106 recoilless rifle which are too large to fire at Keesler. The other important aim of the training was to further increase our knowledge of the techniques of defensive warfare stressing battalion cohesiveness.

Many a morning was spent in the open air classrooms of Camp Lejeune where there was little chance that a trainee would fall asleep; the air conditioning was more than adequate! The Marine instructors were excellent, and their points were well made through the benefit of first hand experience.

Like the training at Keesler, the Lejeune training ended in a defensive perimeter exercise. Second only to the successful defense of the perimeter, a major achievement was that, after being drenched by a driving rain on the last night of the exercise, the men were able to ready themselves and equipment for a captain's inspection only twenty-four hours later!

TRANSITION TO VIETNAM

You knew in advance where you were going; you had been told long ago and since then the name Hue-Phu Bai, Republic of Vietnam had been constantly on your mind.

You have been sent through military training and were taught how to use the modern implements of war. You have also been sent to schools to better learn the tools of your trade. In general, you have learned to build and to defend what you have constructed.

When the months of training were completed there seemed to be a lull, and during "the lull before the storm" you were sent home on leave. How great it was to be home! Hue-Phu Bai seemed a million light years away, but as per usual, time passed swiftly and once again you found yourself as a small, vital part of a huge, complex machine. Time continued on and before long you were standing in the hot Southern sun waiting to board the huge C-130 which would carry you away from your home, your country, and your loved ones.

You found a place to sit and when the doors were closed and the engines started, you gazed at the faces of the men who were going the same way. It is just as you pictured it. The stiffling heat, the security bunkers, the gun emplacements, and the camouflaged aircraft.

As you proceed toward your base, you cannot help but notice the rapid pace of the people in a war torn land. The small, dark complected people wave to you as you pass by, and small children dot the side of the road. It is hard to conceive that these same kind of people are your enemy, your very reason for being here.

Bravo Company

Bravo Company is perhaps the most versatile company in a Mobile Construction Battalion. The company is composed of electricians, utilitiesmen, builders and steelworkers. Delta Company







When I arrived near the middle of the deployment, Delta Company had already made a name for itself. The company had been involved in a variety of jobs ranging from housing to highway support work. Indication of the quantity and quality of the company's work is the fact that it took the newly initiated "Cock-of-the-Walk" award the first two months of the deployment.

Major buildings that were completed the first half of the deployment included quonset huts for MAG-36 and 32nd NCR, the 8RRFS dispensary and Pascoe buildings for FLSG-A.

The bridge crew assumed the work on the Troui River bridge started by MCB-121 and subsequently built four more major bridges on Route One.

Culvert and headwall construction on Route One between Cau Hai and Hue was also a big assignment for the company.

The steelworkers got a workout in completing a 10,000 barrel water tank at the Dong Da water treatment plant.

Both steelworkers and builders pitched-in to lay runway matting at the Phu Bai airport in an around-the-clock record breaking time of 50 hours and 55 minutes.

Other airport work included revetments for both the Marines and the Air Force.

Literally hundreds of strongback-tent frames and Southeast Asia huts were built by the company for the Minimum Essential Requirements (MER) program. At Camp Eagle, construction was done for the 101st Army Airborne, while the detachment "Delta Zula" built at Quang Tri for the Marines.

Seabee Teams

Seabee Teams—"the Navy's Peace Corps" have been active for some time in South-East Asia improving sanitation, providing medical aid and teaching local natives construction skills so highly needed for better living conditions.

Working for the Secretary of State, these Civil Engineer Officers and Construction Tradesmen have done much to aid the people and land. Some examples of this help are bridge building, clearing land, training civilians in the use of equipment, building houses, and Navy Corpsmen treating native citizens' diseases and ailments.

Each thirteen man team is composed of one Civil Engineer Corps Officer or Warrant Officer, one Hospital Corpsman and eleven Construction Tradesmen. Together they undergo a period of rigorous and intensified training to develop a high degree of physical fitness along with a broad knowledge of at least two Seabee rates. In addition, they must learn methods of communicating these skills to the local natives.
