








HISTORY OF

NAVAL MOBILE CONSTRUCTION BATTALION ONE THIRTY THREE, the KANGROO Battalion, deployed to Europe with the ever present "CAN DO" spirit and the will to succeed. The KANGROO Battalion has succeeded in erecting quality building through Europe and again the "CAN DO" spirit has done enormous tasks. The "CAN DO" spirit of ONE THIRTY THREE was not just suddenly there, it grew with the pride of the Battalion.

On September 17, 1943, NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION ONE THIRTY THREE was commissioned at Camp Perry, Williamsburg, Virginia. Following seven months of rigorous training at Davisville, RHODE ISLAND, Gulfport, Mississippi, and Port Hueneme, California, the KANGROO Battalion was ready for action. The nickname "KANGROO" was picked-up by the Battalion because of the first scheduled assignment was Australia. However, NAVAL AIR STATION, Honolulu became the first job site. Building seaplane docks, erecting fuel tanks, raising the level of the airfield, the spirit of "CAN DO" slowly came to the surface as quality building was done out of available material. Using the construction talents of the Seabees, this airfield was to become the largest and busiest in the Pacific.

February 19, 1945, the invasion of Iwo Jima began. ONE THIRTY THREE accompanied the invasion force, with Bees maintaining supply lines and forming shore parties to the Marines. On D-Day plus one, the Seabees were ready to begin repair work on the first captured Japanese runway. In six days the runway was operational for light planes. Later the runway was extended for bombers. With the capture of a second runway the "CAN DO" men of ONE THIRTY THREE worked day and night to build the largest runway in the western Pacific amid sniper fire, mortar attacks and natural hazards. In the five months the KANGROO Battalion spent on Iwo Jima, the "CAN DO" men had moved more that 1,000,000 cubic yards of earth and produced more than 100,000 tons of crushed rock. ONE THIRTY THREE substained more casualities in their participation in the invasion of Iwo Jima than any other construction battalion in WW II. Because of ONE THIRTY THREE's role in the invasion of Iwo Jima the battalion received the Navy Unit Commendation. In December, 1945, during wartime status gearing down to peace time, NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION ONE THIRTY THREE was decommissioned.

On August 12, 1966, at Construction Battalion Center, Gulfport, Mississippi, NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION ONE THIRTY THREE was recommissioned. After six months regrowth to Battalion size and training the Kangroo Battalion embarked February, 1967, on a Vietnam tour to DaNang. Building a second increment for a prisoner of war camp and rock staging area at Observation Point were two of the major projects of the tour. Due to the "CAN DO" accomplishments of the KANGROO Battalion a Second Navy Unit Commendation was awarded. Phu Bai, Vietnam became the deployment site in 1968. The major project at Phu Bai was the monumental task of overlaying the Hue-Phu Bai airstrip with over 18,000 individual sheets of matting. Within fifty-one hours the strip was complete while still allowing the field to be used during the daylight hours.

ACHIEVEMENT

A third deployment was made to Vietnam in 1969. During this last deployment in Vietnam the Seabees of KANGROO, based at Camp Wilkerson, reconstructed the 268 foot center span of the main highway bridge at Hue, reworked approximately seventy miles of paved highway, extended 95 culverts and repaired dozens of bridges.

A deployment of "Firsts" began with the assignment to Guam in June 1970. The phrase "The Sun Never Sets On 133" became a reality as details spread more than halfway around the world. With Guam as the Main Body Headquarters, the Details spread to Bien Hoa in the Republic of Vietnam to the Azores and Aleutian Island chains at Alaska.

From Guam to Okinawa read the deployment list in 1972 for NMCB 133. With details scattered all over the Pacific, the KANGROO Battalion began major projects in Kien Hoa Province, Republic of Vietnam; Meon, Truk Islands; MCAS, Iwakuni, Japan; Oahu, Hawaii, and Subic Bay, Philippines.

Again, NMCB 133 enjoyed a first with a deployment to Europe. The Main Body of the KANGROO Battalion was assigned to Rota, Spain with details stretching all over the Mediterranean and one in the Indian Ocean. The KANGROO Battalion's Detail Chagos on Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean assisted in the building of the single largest project in the Naval Construction Force's history, Reindeer Communication Station. Meanwhile in the Mediterranean, Detail Kangroo at Souda Bay, Crete worked on the building of pre-fab Lewis Buildings and the building of eight steel framed buildings; Detail Wallaby at Sigonella, Sicily strived and succeeded on a project of a no-break power system at the communications station located there; at Nea Makri, Greece Detail Koala has built an A-1 Air Conditioning System and fuel tanks; proceeding Westward again Detail Jumbuck at Naples, Italy built an olympic size swimming pool; La Maddalena, Sardina the site of KIWI, a sewage outlet for submarine tenders was built; Detail Drongo at Todendorf, Germany completed and with ceremonies opened a new communications room at the Communications Station there. During this time the Main Body at Rota, Spain worked on the Jet shop, drilled test wells for water, built an extension on to the DGF High School, built a track for the school, completed work on the computer room, in addition to civic-action projects.

Returning home in July, 1973, the KANGROO Battalion trained for the next deployment and the efforts recreated in this book will be sharpened toward more professionalism. With the end of the European deployment the "CAN DO" spirit of the KANGROO Battalion has left a permanent quality construction mark in Europe and Diego Garcia.

Our Europe - Diego Garcia deployment has been an extremely challenging one professionally and demanding physically. The mission has been construction and that is exactly what we have accomplished. At every site we took over a large workload of projects in progress. We have completed them as we set out to do. The principal reason for this success is that everyman has done his job and done it well. When any organization achieves that level of team co-operation the result is invariably success of the goal.

Beyond the construction work, the long hours and the difficult weather, there are many pleasant times to remember as well. The R&R to Bangkok, tours of Spain, weekends in Rome, Athens, and Copenhagen all added to the deployment, and gave us renewed enthusiasm of other countries and cultures.

I commend each of you for your effort and contribution to the deployment. Because of those efforts, the KANGROO Battalion has again demonstrated its ability to meet any challenge.

There were also several civic action type jobs for churches in near-by Jerez and Rota. Those consisted of a soccer field and the grading of a playground area along with several smaller projects. ALFA COMPANY also acted in support of BRAVO COMPANY in the site preparations for their jobs and also by operating a concrete batch plant to provide concrete for the vertical phase of construction.

They were also kept busy performing the numerous support functions required to keep the equipment at the various detail sites running.

SERVICE AND CONSTRUCTION ARE BRAVO'S BUSINESS



Due to the shortage of personnel in Rota the Battalion Organization was made up with only three companies consisting of HQ., ALFA, and BRAVO. BRAVO's Company Commander Ensign Knoll, an Electrical Engineer, and Second in Command was Ensign (Penny) Irvine, who was also Embark Officer. Our Company Chief was BUC Fetterley and project chiefs were Chief Palmer, Chief Duncan, Chief Cupac, Chief Frieze, and Chief Williams. Chief Williams was only with us for a short period and then he moved up the hill as quality control chief.

Some of the projects assigned at the start of the deployment were the Jet shop, Rota School, Ops Building, and Computer Room. A later project was the gym extension. Chief Cupac became popular with the troops by re-styling the heating system and getting the equipment to produce heat in sufficient quantities to make the barracks bearable. Upon completion of this, the entire camp maintenance section began a systematic check of the camp and set up priorities for a maintenance schedule program to get the camp back into proper working order. This is now past history and the camp is in the best condition that is has been in for years. In January, Lt. Harper and his detachment from Souda Bay, Crete arrived in Rota due to technical problems with the Greek Government and began a program of barracks rehab, that put rooms in a number of the quonset huts. However they were recalled to Crete prior to completion of this and without the necessary personnel to continue the program has ground to a halt. All projects moved along well and even the seasonal rain and thunder and lightning storms could not lower the morale of the unit.

It was early in the deployment that the Command started to schedule Rap Sessions to bring personnel from all rates and pay grades together and talk out any problems. Many helpful suggestions were submitted and the program was considered beneficial and made part of the Battalion's schedule. One of the suggestions that was brought up at the sessions was to let men that had gone to a school work in their trade. Several of the men got their first opportunity to work in their rates since their arrival in the Battalion.

The men of BRAVO Company would like to thank EO1 Robinson for the out/standing job he did in scheduling the many sightseeing tours as well as tours to many places for the observance of special occasions. All hands took advantage of the tours to visit places inaccessible to them under normal circumstances. Many of the men who have their families here also took their families on these tours. On the subject of recreation, Ensign (Penny) Irvine was sighted many times flying on the right hand of the Battalion's own Sky King; Penny is also a demolition Derby Champ and Ace Pilot. HT2 Sanford, a rodeo clown from B. Co., met Skunk, a 1500 pound Brama Bull, and Skunk was officially declared the winner after a two minute scrimmage between the two. Sanford is still the FASTEST crawler in the outfit, but no one has completed the course with Skunk in pursuit. Our game room was updated and many pool sharks have come and gone but BU1 Jarvis seems to remain as the man to beat. A relaxed schedule for leave was put into effect by the CNO during this deployment and many personnel have taken advantage of it to visit home or to tour Europe.

As we look backward on the deployment, we see a long list of jobs either completed or running well and feel a sense of pride in having been a part of KANGROO'S 1972/1973 European Deployment. We all look forward to home port and the chance to be with family and friends and rest and relaxation to prepare for next year's deployment and the needs of the Navy where ever they might be.

THE NON-BEES

You could better describe a Seabee Battalion as an automobile with all its integral parts. A car can/not operate properly with even one small part missing. It can function partially with a wheel removed or a spark plug missing, but it would not accomplish what it was meant to do without all the various parts.

A Battalion is so much the same way. If you took the SW's or CM's away from a Battalion it would still be a Battalion. But it would only function partly and not like a Battalion should. There is one very important part of a car that it must have to complete its full mission. If a car had all the parts it needed and they were all in perfect shape, it still would not go anywhere without this one part. A car has to have an operator. Someone that takes the potential of the parts and makes them work so it can go down the road.

The non-Bees are the operators of a Battalion, in a sense of the word. They take care of all records, letters, legal matters, transportation orders, leave, etc. They keep up to date on what the Navy is doing as a whole. The list of responsibilities tasked to the non Bees could go on and on.

It is evident then that this essential group is an important part of a Battalion. On the other hand, a Battalion could do without these non-Bees and still be a Battalion. But what does a car do without a operator: It would just sit there!!

The people that make up these so called non-Bees are the people of the Admin/Personnel office: the Battalion Yeomen and Personnelmen. The reason for their being called non-Bees is because they eat, party, shower, sleep and dress like Seabees, but they are not Seabees; rather they are Fleet personnel that help make up one of the great Navy Organizations: THE SEABEES.



THE ISLAND

Participating in the largest single project being carried on by units of the Naval Construction Force, the men of Detail Dingo successfully augmented the efforts to build Reindeer Station, Diego Garcia, British Indian Ocean Territory, from 12 November 1972 to 12 June 1973. Under the leadership of Officer in Charge, Lt P.G. Corrigan, the Bees of 133 continued Island work which was first begun in March of 1971.

Reindeer Station construction involves the completion of a permanent Communications Station with all necessary supporting facilities. Included are communications structures and equipment, air operations facilities to co-ordinate traffic for an 7,000 foot runway, modern living quarters and recreational buildings, limited harbor support structures, and administrative, Public Works, and Supply buildings and equipment. The purpose of this construction is to close a gap in the Navy World Wide Communications System and to provide communications support to the United States and United Kingdom ships and aircraft in the Indian Ocean.

A wide variety of work was available for Det. Dingo, as MCB 133 men were spread out to support direct labor on most all Island projects. Specifically, Dingo was assigned management responsibility for initial or in progress construction of an Air Operations Building, regulator vault, sewage lagoon, Rawin weather building, BOQ and BEQ construction, water and sewage distribution system, and a desalinization wet well. While supporting on site NMCB's 62 and 74, the KANGROO Seabees witnessed the commissioning of the NAVCOMMSTA in March and the opening of MAC C-141 operations on the airstrip in April. Our efforts were also rewarded by frequently meriting the Battalion's KANGROO of The Walk Award recognizing monthly performance while deployed. In December, detail member BU2 N.K. Honaker was named Island Sailor of the Month in competition with all Island personnel.

Although work days were long, Dingo members found time enough for numerous means of recreation. The beautiful coral atoll waters provided a tropical paradise for snorkeling, fishing and sailing enthusiasts. Softball at the Coconut Bowl, Putt-putt Golf, and visits to the old Coconut Plantation were also favorite pastimes. Special Services' six-day R&R program allowed personnel the opportunity to discover the enchantment of Bangkok or simply take those days for on Island leisure. A grand highlight of the deployment was the Christmas day visit of Bob Hope's USO Tour.

At the deployment's end, we could all take pride in unit teamwork which produced significant construction achievements for Reindeer Station. Though ingrained with water hours, wearing "Hot Pants", psyching for mail call, and living with sand, land crabs, donkeys, and chickens, we knew that homeport adjustment would not be too hard to bear.



On 9 March 1973, all CEC Officers and group VIII personnel in the area got together and celebrated the Seabee Anniversary.



THE MOBILE DETAIL - KANGROO

Detail Kangroo, and its initial 25 members, under the leadership of LT J.P. Harper, deployed from Gulfport in November, 1972, to Crete, the largest of the fabled Greek Islands, where the detail was head-quartered at U.S. Naval Detachment Souda Bay. The primary mission of the men of Kangroo was to relieve the critical barracks shortage on board the NAV DET by constructing the 4 BEQ's and 2 BOQ's included in project P-729.

Because NMCB-10 had departed Crete long before our arrival, the advance party from KANGROO began work immediately to set up required shop and office spaces. Although P-729 carried the highest priority in Europe, the project lacked official approval required for commencement. From November until Mid-January the detail, with approximately 25 men, completed several small projects for the NAV DET. These included construction of a Mark III Lewis Bldg. for the base rec hall, a complete renovation of the all hands club, several improvements to the galley, and a power substation. In January, materials for small projects depleted and permission for P-729 not forthcoming, LT Harper and the majority of the detail returned to Rota, Spain. Left on site were CM1 Blevins, EO1 Frost, and CE2 Arico, to cycle equipment brought in from Nea Makri and the mainbody, and to receive and stage large volumes of construction materials for P-729. During this time Blevins was frocked to CMC.

While with the mainbody, the detail functioned as a separate entity and completed several much needed renovations' within the Seabee Camp. Among these were the complete rehab of the special services game room, the renovating and partitioning of five enlisted barracks and the construction of a 40 X 80 Pascoe Building for an MLO lumber shed. Although these projects in Rota were not the detail's primary deployment objective, the men of Kangroo gained satisfaction in providing better facilities for their fellow Seabees. In addition our stay in Spain provided new and different sites to see during liberty hours.

April 7, 1973, was a big day for the Detail, in that the go ahead for P-729 at Souda Bay was granted that day. LT Harper and SWC Pearce anticipating the command, were already on site. BUC Jones and about 20 detail personnel arrived later that week. Pulling old detail personnel from all over the Med., within 10 days detail Kangroo numbered 35 men on site in Souda Bay. During the remainder of the deployment the detail built up to around 50 men with new arrivals to the Battalion. Even UTC CUPAC joined the detail to advise on utilities installation. With the Goal of constructing 3 Pascoe buildings (40 X 100), 1 BEQ and 2 BOQ's, clearly ahead of us, the detail went to work 10 hours a day six days a week to get the job done.

Liberty around the Island of Crete, with its ancient ruins and friendly, interesting people, was quite different from former WESTPAC deployments. However the men of Kangroo enjoyed all the off duty time to the fullest, making a good many friends in the close by city of Chania.

At the end of our European Deployment Detail Personnel felt they had made significant construction contributions to both NAV DET Souda Bay and Seabee Camp Rota, Spain, and appreciated the chance to visit a great deal of Europe in their travels.






PLAINS OF MARATHON

All in all it was a very interesting and educational deployment.







DETAIL SIGONELLA

Detail Sigonella's 12 man advance party arrived in Sunny Sig on 27 October, 1972. The BEEP was conducted quickly and before we knew it NMCB 10 had gone and the main body had arrived. A total of ten projects were awaiting us, six had already been started by the previous details. By far the biggest project was a two phase addition to the communications building. The reinforced concrete structure with concrete block walls, concealed piping, and electrical conduit and plastered walls gave the detail an opportunity to gain valuable experience and to exhibit their construction skills. Late March showed their ability to adjust quickly and begin work as soon as preliminary drawings were available.

Other projects assigned were (1) the completion of two Pre-engineered Buildings for an interim Air Cargo terminal and an interim air passenger terminal. These buildings were completed and turned over to NAF Sigonella in May. (2) Completion of an emergency diesel generator building housing three 250 kilowatt generators; (3) Completion of the rehabilitation of the transient barracks; (4) Completion of the rehabilitation of the galley, including installation of an air conditioning system; (5) Wiring and installation of electronic test benches at the avionics shop; (6) and supervision and construction help in a self help project for rehabilition of the barracks. It was hoped that all of the above projects would be completed before being relieved by NMCB 40. The detail worked many long hours in an effort to accomplish this goal. Our biggest hinderance in this effort was the weather.

The months from December through March were difficult months for construction as Sunny Sig turned to Muddy Sig. Detail personnel assisted in flood control on New Year's Eve and helped to pull a P-3 airplane out of the mud at the end of the runway in January. Rains continued throughout the winter and early spring making it difficult to walk as you sometimes ended knee deep in Mud.

April and May brought better weather to Sigonella and construction began to proceed at a faster pace. The detail began to see the fruits of their labor as two projects were turned over to NAF Sigonella. The foundations at the communications building addition were poured in early May after many months of floundering in the mud. Additionally the weather brought the change for detail personnel to take weekend trips in the Mediterranean. On April 13 of the detail personnel took advantage of an R&R trip to Athens. While there, most of the people stayed with their counterparts at Detail Nea Makri not far from Athens.

In May the detail sent its bus on a trip to the Italian Grand Prix, better known as the Targa Floria. A good time was had by all as they were able to see the cars from extremely close range. Phase I of the communications addition was finished in mid-May with appropriate ceremonies and a party attended by detail and communications personnel.

Through late May and June the weather was very hot and work was tough as the big push for project completion was the foremost goal. A lot of effort went into forming and pouring concrete at the communications building Phase II. Those months also saw the completion of the galley rehab, transient barracks rehab, and the diesel generator projects. When NMCB 40 arrived, a few finishing touches remained for them to complete at the communications building, but all other work was completed by the detail before departing.

Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 133 Detail KIWI deployed to La Maddalena, Sardinia, Italy, on 26 March 1973 with Ens Michael G. Kennedy as Officer-in-Charge. The detail worked on two projects while deployed: Interim sewage disposal and a recreation court. 
