

#### **FOREWARD**

This book contains the opening chapters in the story of United States Naval Mobile Construction Battalian No. 6. ### COMMISSIONING

Orders were received by each of us: "On or about May 1st report to Norfolk, Virginia to assist in the formation of U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion No. SIX." By May 3rd we had arrived, seven officers of the Civil Engineer Corps. We came from Norfolk, Charleston, Philadelphia, Corpus. Christi, Port Hueneme, Bayonne, and Davisville. We didn't know much about the Navy's newest adaptation for the use of Seabees, but we knew that what they wanted we could do—with help.

Our help turned out to be six hundred of the fiinest men from all sections of these United States. Mostly reserves, with a nucleus of U.S. Navy Regulars to give a core for training—and for two months, training was rough.

The morning of May 3rd dawned in the usual manner of a May morning in Norfolk except that the pulse of 600 men beat a little faster; for today was THE day. At 1400 we were to become a battalion. The morning passed, came noon chow, and at 1300 for the first time we met our men. At that moment we became Mobile Construction Battalion No. SIX. We liked each other. The Admiral's speech; the Commanding Officer's reply; the pomp and ceremony of the presentation of the colors, although impressive, did not do it; we became what we are when we met — we liked each other.

The Battalion embarked on the USS NAVARRO (APA-215) and sailed for Bermuda the next morning. On May 8 we disembarked by companies,



formed on the pier and marched off to the strains of the "Song of the Seabees" played by our own band, with each man having in his possession the first edition of the Battalion paper, "THE LOG", which in December, seven months later, was to win the award for the best paper in the overseas edition of the Armed Forces Press Service.

In Bermuda a four week's round of concentrated military training was started. The schedule included a smattering of everything in the Landing Party Manual but concentrated on weapons. Every man in the battalion fired all the types of weapons in the Seabee arsenal on the British range, which our allies had put at our disposal. To assist us in this training we had the kind and helpful assistance of LT Daskalakis, U.S. Marine Corps, and his detachment.

This training was not just a matter of squeezing triggers on machine guns, BARs, tommy guns, and carbines. The boys were really trained in maneuvering, firing, and tactics for small units.



During this period the technical training boys were preparing with a glint in their eyes to execute their training program. The Operations Officer, LT Ted E. Rowe, (CEC), USNR, had outlined several training projects, and the Commanding Officer, Commander Richard D. Pinkerton, (CEC), USN, had arranged the work in such a manner that each section chief had a procession of men continually passing through his hands, thereby allowing him to make a completed evaluation of the capabilities of the individuals. By this method, at the end of our shakedown period, we had formed well-knit work parties to handle the projects on our construction plans for Guantanamo.











Bermuda, "The Enchanted Isle," —it was not all work and training there. The liberty program was generous and the Bermudians were very hospitable. Special Services had been a hard working department from the day we embarked on the NAVARRO. Under the guidance of CHCARP L. V. Margolies, USN, a show was staged aboard the second day out, and in Bermuda, a recreation program was initiated that produced many happy hours. A "help others" program was also inaugurated, a program that has gone far in building the spirit and pride of the battalion. Starting with a benefit show for the bereaved family of a civilian worker of the Navy, at which over \$300 was raised, the battalion continued



to give shows for fleet units, naval base activities, and finally raised over \$900 for the March of Dimes. Our band played in the mess halls, for dances, and on request for any naval function. Our boys — landing on an island devoted to catering to well-to-do tourists and not encouraging the enlisted men in the better places — sold the U.S. Navy to such an extent that by July 6th when we left, sailors, that is Seabees, were a common sight at the Belmont Manor, Elbow Beach, Princess and Castle Harbor Hotels.

In July the time came to leave for our first operation. That battalion again embarked on the USS NAVARRO, our old friend, and set sail for Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.







We were now on our way to becoming a well-knit-unit, a working organization, and a Mobile Construction Battalion; and from Commander to Seaman Apprentice, we knew we could do a job — any job.

As Seabees will, when given the opportunity, all hands that could find a job aboard the NAVARO went to work to help the crew of the ship. The gunner's mates assisted in repairing the 20mm batteries, the electrician's mates repaired the fans and ventilators, and as fast as the ship's First Lieutenant requested men, the boys volunteered. The hours went by, speeded by band concerts in the evening and a "Happy Hour" put on by ship's company and Seabees, until on the morning of 9 July we tied up at the Naval Operating Base, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. On the wharf was the Executive Officer, LCDR F. B. Wimer, (CEC), USNR, and his advance party.

## MILITARY TRAINING


In order to assume the vestige of a military organization as quickly as possible the battalion underwent an initial period of two week's intensive military training, gaining the fundamentals of the combat infantryman, so often required of the Seabees.

After the first few weeks of training began to pass, it became apparent that MCB6 had vast potentials in the broad scope of the background of its men. Although there were many young men to whom military life was new, there was a strong lacing of seasoned veterans of World War II, most of whom were former Seabees, returning to the service with their civilian life construction experience.







## BUILDING SHOPS








The next week was devoted to setting up for operations. Shops Company established a central tool issue room and set up carpenter, paint, pipe and welding shops. Equipment Company built grease racks and service pits and overhauled equipment. The Construction Company studied personnel and formed crews, drew tools, ordered material, and, in general, prepared for assigned tasks. Headquarters Company was not idle during this period—LT A. W. Snow, (CEC), USN, set up his organization to such good advantage that, although the battalion was widely scattered, good housekeeping and organization was maintained.

By the time we were ready to commence our operations, the additional officers to complete our complement had joined the battalion. The original seven had been increased to thirteen, including a Medical Officer, LTJG F. A. Shemwell, (MC), USNR; a Dental Officer, LTJG R. J. Kuester, (DC), USNR; a Machinist, MACH C. E. Ackerman, USN; and three CEC officers, LT J. D'Aquila, (CEC), USNR; LTJG G. J. Cavanagh, (CEC), USNR; and LTJG S. A. Gilles, (CEC), USN.

The Commanding Officer and his staff had been holding conferences with the Public Works Officer of the Station and had planned the construction program so that the work schedule started promptly.

During the 4 month period 1 August to 1 December 1951, MCB6 was assigned and completed 28 projects at Guantanamo Bay.

## **PROJECTS AT**

Although scheduled to stay in Cuba only five months, a huge construction program had been laid out for accomplishment during that time.

Besides the continual program of caring for its own needs, by building warehouses, offices, shops, and storage areas, the undaunted Seabees tackled large construction projects for the Naval Base proper. The first and foremost project was the paving of Wharf "Baker", which required removing some 76,000 sq. feet of old paving and repaving the area with a concrete apron eight inches thick.


Working conditions were such that it was necessary to pour all the concrete at night, since the heat of the Cuban sun would dry the concrete before it had a chance to set. Also the necessity of keeping the port clear of construction equipment during the daytime for ship loading and unloading operations was an important factor in the decision to pour the concrete at night.

Another job of great importance was the construction of the Sherman Avenue By-pass, a short cut-off of the main thoroughfare of the Naval Base. This bypass eliminated much of the congestion on Sherman Avenue during the rush hours and will save time in traveling to and from the Air Station. The job entailed the moving of over 20,000 cubic yards of earth and slicing away a large chunk of mountain.



#### WELDING PROJECT



Work was also done on the oil storage tanks, reinforcing steel and numberless small jobs that usually drift into a welding shop. Upon arrival in Cuba, work began in earnest and the welding crew was consistently busy turning out high quality work concerned with maintenance, repair of equipment and new construction.

The welding of steel and other metals wasn't all the welding done by this group, by far. On the various tours since the conception of the battalion, they have welded themselves into a tight-knit group which specializes in good fellowship and high production that would make them stand out in any organization.

The standard of the work turned out by these men has been consistently high, and they have proved themselves invaluable to the Battalion.











