#### III. OPERATIONS

The beginning of the New Year 1984 found the "BEAR ACES" of VAW-124 in their homeport of Norfolk. The year promised to be an exciting one for the men of VAW-124, and that promise was delivered. There were detachments to Roosevelt Roads, Key West, MCAS Yuma, Fallon, and Nellis AFB. Along with these "Dets" there were numerous rumors about our ship the NIMITZ (CVN-68). All personnel were ready and prepared for the New Year.

VAW-124 provided "Orange Air", being the "BAD GUYS", in Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico in mid February. This was to be the beginning of some invaluable training for the "BEAR ACES". Following Roosy Roads, we went to Nellis AFB, where we were tasked with being the "GOOD GUYS". The "BEAR ACES" worked alongside the U.S. Air Force, Marine Corps, Army and Navy, demonstrating the E2-C's capabilities.

Immediately following Nellis we went straight to MCAS Yuma, where we began working with CAG-8. Tactics and procedures were rehearsed, and more importantly, our squadron's professional development continued maturing.

VAW-124, along with CAG-8, next travelled to NAS Fallon. We were assigned Airborne Early Warning responsibilities. Many strikes were to take place against Luke AFB and the Marines of Twenty-Nine Palms. VAW-124 and CAG-8 were very successful, winning praise from both the Air Force and the Marine Corps.

The next few months saw VAW-124 based at NAS Norfolk. During this time flight operations concentrated on pilot training operations, culminating in Carrier Qualifications (CQ) for our pilots in USS KENNEDY.

In late September, VAW-124 was ready for sea assignment, Shakedown and Refresher Training in USS NIMITZ (CVN-68). SHAKEDOWN/REFTRA was an interesting experience for the entire squadron. This period provided valuable training, considering the sizeable turnover of personnel that occurs following an overhaul period.

November began with VAW-124 ready for Phase 1A. This period concentrated on the "Bread and Butter" missions of VAW-124: Airborne Early Warning, Air Intercept Control, Surface Subsurface Surveillance Control, Search and Rescue, and flight following of CAG-8 aircraft assets using the various bombing ranges of Gitmo and Roosy.

The New Year promises to be a great one to be a "BEAR ACE" with deployment in early spring.
