





#### BEAR ACE HISTORY 1989

Following Carrier Qualification in early January, the squadron conducted blue water operations while transiting the Atlantic on board the USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN-71). The ship entered the Mediterranean Sea on 11 January and participated in the National Week 89 exercise. During this exercise, the Roosevelt battle group completed turnover and conducted dual CVBG training with the USS John F. Kennedy battle group in the Tyrahenian Sea. VAW-124 participated in every facet of this event, coordinating all aspects of command and control in every warfare area. Following National Week, the squadron worked closely with Tunisian Air Force and naval units during the Tunisian PASEX from 20-23 January. VAW-124 was primarily responsible for conducting air liaison with the Tunisian Air Force and GCI sites. The first port visit of the cruise was Palma, Spain on 24 January.

After the Palma visit, the squadron CQ'd in the western Mediterranean before beginning a short exercise with Spanish forces in early February. A steady pace of operations continued with the PHINIA 89 exercise, a bilateral French and US exercise with the Roosevelt and the FNS Clemenceau, and a CEM MISSILEX, a live missile firing. A squadron detachment visited Geilenkirchen, Germany to interface with NATO AWACS units and discuss ESM in battle group operations. The USS Theodore Roosevelt arrived in Marseille, France on 10 February. Foul weather and heavy seas forced the USS Theodore Roosevelt to get underway to avoid drifting into shallow water. After Marseille, routine cyclic flight operations culminated in freedom of navigation operations off the coast of Libya. These tense operations came to a close with a port visit in Alexandria, Egypt. Leaving Alexandria behind, flight operations continued into March in the eastern Mediterranean. February ended as the squadron achieved a 100% boarding rate for the month.

The next port call was Antalya, Turkey on 3 March. Departing Antalya, normal flight operations continued as the squadron transited the east and central Mediterranean until 13 March. The 13th to 19th was spent in Naples, Italy. The squadron then operated for three days in the western Mediterranean ending with a port call in Tangiers, Morocco. March was closed out with flight operations in the central Mediterranean, and at an Augusta Bay training anchorage.


In April, Central Mediterranean operations continued until the ship's return to port in Toulon, France. Prior to Toulon, two aircraft flew to NAS Sigonella, Italy from 2-10 April to train and upgrade junior pilots. The squadron reunited in mid-April for central Mediterranean operations and then enjoyed a three day port visit in Monaco. After Monaco, the squadron participated in the DATEX exercise and then in the largest exercise yet of the cruise, Dragon Hammer 89. Dragon Hammer was a major, multinational NATO exercise. VAW-124 provided Task Force support in the form of air intercept control, war at sea coordination, over the horizon AEW coverage for Battle Group Commanders, and surface search control to establish an Orange Force picture for ASUWC. Dragon Hammer ended 2 May; the ship visited Haifa, Israel on 4 May.





The next exercise was Juniper Stallion from 16-18 May. The short exercise took place in the eastern Mediterranean. The next week was spent transiting the Mediterranean Sea towards the final port call of the cruise. The week long Palma, Spain port visit lasted into June. When the squadron departed Palma, it participated in the Sardinia 89 exercise followed by another training anchorage and then the National Week 89B exercise. The Sardinia 89 event brought together Italian, Spanish, French, NATO and American forces to provide advanced training for air, land, and maritime forces. VAW-124 was instrumental in the success of this exercise. National Week 89B marked the last major exercise of the cruise. This exercise included integrated CVBG operations with the USS Theodore Roosevelt, USS America, and USS Coral Sea Battle Groups, along with CVBG turnover between the USS Coral Sea and USS Theodore Roosevelt Battle Groups. The USS Theodore Roosevelt outchopped the Mediterranean on 21 June and arrived in port Norfolk, Virginia on 30 June.

Operating from Norfolk, Virginia, the Bear Aces remained busy during the rest of 1989 providing operational detachments to several locations. Two planes went to Patrick Air Force Base in Cocoa Beach, Florida to cover a Space Shuttle launch in early August. A larger detachment went to Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico to participate in Orange Air Operations from 25 August to 4 September. A detachment went to Brunswick, Maine from 11-13 September for AEGIS support. Three drug interdiction detachments occurred during the last quarter. VAW-124 operated out of Guantanamo Bay, Cuba from 16-21 October and then again during the last week of December. A detachment was also staged in Key West, Florida during mid-November.
