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#### COMMAND HISTORY UPDATE 1992

The "Bear Aces" of VAW-124 began 1992 in their homeport of Norfolk , Virginia. The high operational tempo of the "turn around" cycle and predeployment workups resulted in a detachment or at-sea period in all twelve months of 1992.

On 6 January, VAW-124 sent two aircraft to NAS Bermuda for twelve days of Counternarcotics Operations near the southeast coast of the United States and the northern Caribbean. Later in the month, VAW-124 participated in a USMC Hawk Missile Exercise on 16-17 January, providing range surveillance and coordination.

The Bear Aces joined CVW-8 in NAS Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico to participate as the opposition Orange Forces for the 1-10 February, CVW-17 FLETEX. VAW-124 returned home to coordinate a two-day CVW-8 Missile Exercise beginning on 19 February in the VACAPES Warning Area.

Next, the Bear Aces traveled to NAS Key West, Florida on 8 March to participate in the Strike Fighter Advanced Readiness Program (SFARP) with VFA-15. The nearly three weeks of intensive training provided both squadrons with exceptional tactical experience working as a "Hawkeye-Hornet" team.

On 3 April, CDR Thomas A. Parker relieved CDR J.J. George as the twenty-second Commanding Officer of VAW-124. The next day, an advance detachment departed for Howard AFB, Panama to prepare for the squadron's arrival on 12 April. During the seven-week Panama deployment, the squadron completed a total of 133 Counternarcotics sorties and amassed 561 flight hours with a 100% sortie completion rate in support of CJTF-4.

The Bear Aces returned to Norfolk for two weeks to prepare for their first at-sea period in over nine months. On 8 June, VAW-124 and CVW-8 flew aboard the USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) for an eighteen-day Independent Steaming Exercise (ISE) in the Puerto Rico OPAREA. The trip was highlighted with a four-day port visit to St. Thomas.

The squadron remained in Norfolk for most of July, with a brief CQ period aboard USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) from 18-21 July, and CVW-8 Missile Exercises on 25 and 30 July.

On 7 August, the Bear Aces returned aboard the USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) to "officially" begin the pre-deployment workup cycle with Refresher Training. VAW-124 flew 50 sorties in support of a tremendously successful REFTRA.

Also in August, VAW-124 was awarded the 1991 AEW EXCELLENCE AWARD by VADM Less, Commander, U.S. Naval Air Force Atlantic Fleet. This award is given annually to the finest E-2C squadron in the Navy.

On 12 September, the Bear Aces arrived at the Naval Strike Warfare Center, NAS Fallon, Nevada, to begin the second phase of "work-ups". The

three-week deployment provided the entire air wing with unparalleled strike planning, tactics, and live ordinance training. Again, the Bear Aces "quarterbacked" the air wing to phenomenal results at "Strike University."

VAW-124 spent the remainder of October and the first week of November in

Norfolk flying local unit-level training missions.

The squadron left Norfolk on 11 November for COMPTUEX aboard the USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71). Following two weeks of extensive training, the ship spent the Thanksgiving holiday in St. Thomas before beginning the hostilities phase. With the successful "war" complete, the USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) returned to Norfolk on 8 December.

On 10 December, the Bear Aces challenged unknown territory by being the first E-2C squadron to conduct the first deployed operational evaluation of the Special Purpose Marine Air/Ground Task Force (SPMAGTF), the CVBG configuration of the future. During COMPTUEX and SPMAGTF in November/December, VAW-124 flew 115 sorties and accumulated 348 flight hours. Returning to Norfolk on 18 December, the Bear Aces closed out another enormously successful year.
