2. Commander's Assessment

The Commander's Assessment briefly tells the story of the command's role in national defense and should highlight any general and specific lessons-learned. It should contain the commander's commentary, insights and reflections on the unit's activities. Attention should be directed to significant issues impacting training, operations and mission accomplishment during the reporting period. USS Robert G. Bradley began 2006 in the middle of an extended maintenance period. During this period the ship received several weapons systems and engineering upgrades to include; NULKA, a slew-arm davit, and the Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) installation. Upon completion of the maintenance period the ship entered an accelerated training cycle which resulted in the completion of the ship's certification well ahead of schedule after successfully completing the ULTRA-E and ULTRA-C certifications and the Final Evaluation Problem (FEP).

Following the training cycle, Robert G. Bradley was selected to participate in BALTOPS 2006, a "Partnership for Peace" exercise in the Baltic Sea. Ships and staffs from Poland, England, France, Sweden, Denmark, Estonia, Germany, Latvia, and the Netherlands operated and trained alongside Robert G. Bradley. This deployment marked the first trans-Atlantic crossing of the ship in nearly five years. While deployed to the Baltic Sea, the ship visited Kiel, Germany; Karlshamn, Sweden; and made an historic port visit to St. Petersburg, Russia during the "White Nights," a period of the year where the sun shines twenty four hours a day. During the visit, Robert G. Bradley welcomed various local dignitaries as well as the Consulate General onboard for a reception. This visit was particularly noteworthy due to the fact that it was the first United States warship to visit in over three years and it also preceded President Bush's visit for the G-8 Summit by one week.

In October, Robert G. Bradley departed on a highly successful Counter Narco-Terrorism deployment to the Eastern Pacific Ocean. Under the operational command of United States Southern Command and the tactical command of Joint Interagency Task Force South (JIATF-S), the ship worked closely with Mexican, Panamanian, Ecuadorian, and Columbian forces, Robert G. Bradley was involved in the seizure, transfer, and disposal of over twenty tons of cocaine.

While deployed to the Eastern Pacific, Robert G. Bradley made port visits to Vasco Nunez de Balboa, Panama; Manta, Ecuador; and Puerto Quetzal, Guatemala. During these visits, not only did Sailors enjoy liberty, but nearly one third of the crew participated in community relations projects that included visits to homes for high risk children, orphans, and a hospital. The projects ranged from general cleaning and yard work to painting.

3. Chronology and Narrative
