JANUARY 1999

USS WHIDBEY ISLAND (LSD 41) began the new year in the middle of the second holiday leave and upkeep period. January 8th, the entire crew returned and continued preparations for the Inter-Deployment Training Cycle's Final Evaluation Period.

Through January 21st, the ship continued the Fleet Maintenance Availability (FMAV) where various pieces of equipment were repaired or replaced. On January 15th, the ship underwent an underwater hull cleansing and inspection.

HT1(SW) SK1(SW/AW) and QM2(SW) reenlisted on January 15th.

The Logistic Maintenance Assist Visit and 3M review began on January 19th. The assist consisted of reviewing the Supply Department's files and logistics programs. The other part of the assist involved reviewing each work center and all maintenance personnel for preventative maintenance procedures and documentation.

Tailored Ship Training Availability (TSTA) III began January 25th inport. During TSTA III, the ship conducted several fast cruise evolutions including multi-hit mass conflagration drills and Chemical, Biological and Radiation (CBR) drills.

WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway on January 27th and 28th in the Virginia Capes Operating Area (VACAPES) in support of TSTA III. Before mooring January 28th, the ship conducted a Non-Combatant Evacuation (NEO) exercise which included helicopter and wet-well operations.

FEBRUARY 1999

On February 1st, WHIDBEY ISLAND embarked Marines and equipment in support of Type Commander Amphibious Training (TCAT). Two days later, WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway in the VACAPES to complete the Final Evaluation Period en route Onslow Bay, North Carolina.

The Final Evaluation Period portion took place February 3rd through February 5th and consisted of a Condition One Alpha drill and a NEO exercise.

TCAT consisted of several Landing Craft Air Cushion (LCAC) operations and Amphibious Assault Vehicle (AAV) launches while at anchor and underway. On February 5th, the ship played a role in the amphibious assault rehearsal. The BATAAN Amphibious Readiness Group (ARG) conducted the amphibious assault again February 6th utilizing lessons learned from the previous day.

On February 8th and 9th, WHIDBEY ISLAND offloaded Marine personnel and equipment before heading home to Naval Amphibious Base (NAB) Little Creek, Virginia.

En route to Virginia, the ship conducted Divisional Tactics with USS BATAAN (LHD 5) and Close-In Weapons System (CIWS) Pre-Alignment Calibration (PAC) fire before mooring at Pier 15S, NAB Little Creek, February 12th.

IT-21 Upgrades began February 15th. These upgrades added communications equipment such as Sailor Phones and ship-wide local area network (LAN) system. Sailor Phones were installed enabling crewmembers to call stateside family members from the ship while underway.

Junior officers spent February 15th through 19th at the Marine Shiphandling Institute Complex improving their ship-handling skills.

Several crewmembers made major career decisions during February. BM2(SW) reenlisted for four years on February 19th. MSCS(SW) retired February 25th after 20 years of service. February 26th, LCDR Thomas J. Lafferty relieved LCDR William G. Sympson as WHIDBEY ISLAND's Executive Officer. The same day Command Master Chief, RMCM(SW) Alexis Hines reenlisted for three years and departed for HC-8 in Norfolk, Virginia.

MARCH 1999

March started off with WHIDBEY ISLAND continuing IT-21 Upgrades and Phase I of the Combat Systems Readiness Review, which evaluated and trained personnel in the Operations Department.

On March 2nd, 4th, and 9th, the semi-annual exam was administered for eligible E-4s, E-5s, and E-6s, respectively.

HT2 reenlisted on March 8th. On March 10th, HT1 retired after 20 years of service, and EN3 and MS3 celebrated their reenlistments March 12th.

WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway for Annapolis, Maryland, March 17th. En route to anchorage, the ship embarked Hopper 34, a LCAC from NAB Little Creek. After a ten-hour sea and anchor detail, the ship anchored outside Annapolis. The following four days, the ship hosted tours for more than 400 Midshipmen from the U.S, Naval Academy and 300 of the general public.

March 22nd, the ship transited back to NAB Little Creek, for the Shipboard Explosive Safety Inspection. BM2 reenlisted a few days later on March 26th.

The second phase of the Combat Systems Readiness Review began March 29th, closing out the month.

APRIL 1999

WHIDBEY ISLAND began April inport at NAB Little Creek, Pier 15S, continuing Phase II of the Combat Systems Readiness Review and IT-21 upgrades.

April 2nd, the ship's s flight deck fire party attended the Helicopter Firefighting Team Trainer at Fleet Training Group Norfolk for refresher training.

The following week, WHIDBEY ISLAND's Medical Department hosted an Environmental Health Survey. The same week, Operations and Deck Departments participated in several Amphibious Squadron and Marine Expeditionary Unit Integration (PMINT) Conferences.

On April 12th, WHIDBEY ISLAND's Commanding Officer, CDR Ray L. Clark, Jr., attended the ARG Commander's Conference in support of the upcoming PMINT.

From April 12th to April 14th, WHIDBEY ISLAND's Junior Officers attended the Shiphandling Complex Trainer while the Operations Specialists attended Radar Navigation Training.

The ship conducted a fast cruise in preparation for PMINT and hosted a Naval Warfare Publications Library Inspection. on April 19th.

WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway for Morehead City, North Carolina on April 20th to onload Marine personnel and equipment. Shortly after entering Thimble Shoal Channel, the ship embarked LCACs 88 and 34.

The following day marked the beginning of the seven-day PMINT which involved the flag ship, BATAAN, and USS SHREVEPORT (LPD 12). Everyday the ship conducted LCAC, AAV, and flight operations in Onslow Bay, North Carolina. The ship would transit close to the beach, launch LCACs and AAVs, and anchor at a pre-designated point. By the end of each day, WHIDBEY ISLAND recovered the LCACs and AAVs before departing for the Cherry Point Operating Area.

During PMINT the ship participated in several Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) exercises, one of which included a simulated drifting mine. For the exercise, WHIDBEY ISLAND marked a suspect mine with a buoy and EOD destroyed the object with explosives. The ARG also participated in a simulated small boat attack.

April 27th, WHIDBEY ISLAND offloaded all AAVs and Marine equipment and the ship detached from COMPHIBRON SIX for the Capstone Exercise.

The Capstone Exercise, which started April 28th, was an amphibious landing demonstration of LCACs for newly designated flag and general officers. Due to inclement weather, WHIDBEY ISLAND detached early and returned to NAB Little Creek, on April 29th.

Later that day, the LCACs offloaded and WHIDBEY ISLAND moored at Pier 15N. The next day, EN1(SW) extended his enlistment for two years, ending a productive and busy month.

MAY 1999

WHIDBEY ISLAND began May inport with a Naval Warfare Publications Library Inspection and a Logistics Management Assessment from May 3rd to May 6th.

May 10th, WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway for Onslow Bay, North Carolina. During the transit, WHIDBEY ISLAND conducted a CISW PAC fire and successfully engaged a Towed Drone Unit with Mount 24.

The ship anchored in Onslow Bay, North Carolina, on May 11th and conducted small boat and AAV operations. Upon completion of amphibious operations, the ship was underway to conduct flight operations.

Shortly after midnight on May 13th, the ship performed a swing ship check to determine magnetic compass deviation. During the day, WHIDBEY ISLAND offloaded the AAVs and conducted more flight operations. By evening, the ship was en route to NAB Little Creek, mooring early May 14th.

From May 10th through May 21st, the ship participated in Commander Second Fleet's Hurricane Exercise 99. The ship also completed underwater hull cleaning from May 17th to May 21st.


WHIDBEY ISLAND commenced a three-week FMAV consisting of 180 different jobs on May 19th. Major work included an overhaul of the boat davit, #2 high pressure air compressor, both anchor windlasses and the ship's refer system. Also during the FMAV, the mess deck scullery machine and the port shaft seal were replaced.

May 25th, WHIDBEY ISLAND hosted a Department of Defense Acquisition Tour. Closing out the month, several department heads attended the Marine Expeditionary Unit Exercise (MEUEX) Embark Conference from May 25th to May 27th.

JUNE 1999

June started with WHIDBEY ISLAND inport and participating in a FMAV. On June 4th, the FMAV period was complete and the ship continued pre-deployment preparations.

June 7th, WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway to the VACAPES with several Midshipmen from the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. After conducting training with the Midshipmen, WHIDBEY ISLAND moored at Pier 15N, NAB Little Creek, the following day.



WHIDBEY ISLAND received a visit June 15th from Commander Amphibious Squadron Six, CAPT Stephen C. Jasper. While aboard, CAPT Jasper addressed the ship's crew on the turntable to discuss the upcoming Mediterranean Deployment.

June 21st, the advance party of the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) arrived onboard while the pre-sail conference was conducted aboard BATAAN.

On June 22nd, WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway for the MEUEX. After receiving LCACs 49 and 88, WHIDBEY ISLAND transited to Morehead City, North Carolina, to embark elements of the 22 MEU.

Upon arrival at Onslow Bay, North Carolina, WHIDBEY ISLAND conducted LCAC and flight operations on a daily basis. June 25th, the ship launched AAVs on Onslow Beach in an amphibious exercise.

Over the next five days, WHIDBEY ISLAND conducted flight operations and launched LCACs in support of ashore objectives. On June 30th, the ship offloaded the majority of the Marine equipment and personnel, then proceeded to NAB Little Creek.

JULY 1999

After an underway replenishment with USNS BIG HORN (TAO 198), WHIDBEY ISLAND returned to NAB Little Creek, on July 1st. A cookout and steel beach picnic was held on the flight deck July 4th for duty section personnel and their families.

July 7th, the special sea and anchor detail was stationed to berth shift WHIDBEY ISLAND in support of the ammunition onload at the Quay Wall.

Underway again July 15th, WHIDBEY ISLAND headed to Onslow Bay to onload the 22 MEU the following day. Various training operations were conducted July 17th, such as LCAC and AAV operations, small boat operations, wet well operations, and flight quarters. During the training operations, Marines conducted a "raid" on Onslow Beach in preparation for exercises they could be conducting during the upcoming Mediterranean deployment.

More LCAC and AAV operations continued on July 19th as well as rig refueling with USS CARNEY (DDG 64). The BATAAN ARG moved 50 nautical miles out to sea July 20th to participate in the Joint Fleet Exercise with the JOHN F. KENNEDY Battle Group (JFKBATGRU). WHIDBEY ISLAND returned to NAB Little Creek, July 24th.

A pre-deployment briefing was held July 27th to answer questions and address concerns of spouses and dependents. The pre-deployment brief for single sailors was held two days later.

July 30th WHIDBEY ISLAND had a training stand down to cover shipboard training and personal qualification standard (PQS) requirements prior to deployment.

AUGUST 1999

August began with WHIDBEY ISLAND in port at NAB Little Creek, continuing with IT-21 upgrades.

On August 3rd, the 22 MEU Executive Officer visited WHIDBEY ISLAND. During the same week, Supply and Engineering Departments attended logistics and maintenance briefs with JFKBATGRU while the Commanding Officer, Operations Officer, and First Lieutenant attended a pre-sail conference aboard BATAAN.

August 9th WHIDBEY ISLAND got underway en route Morehead City and Onslow Bay, North Carolina, to pick up Marine personnel and equipment in preparation for Special Operations Capable Exercise (SOCEX) '99.

The six-day SOCEX events began August 13th. The ship conducted LCAC, AAV, and flight operations in Onslow Bay. Additionally, the ship conducted a NEO exercise in which the ship simulated the rescue of more than 30 personnel.

August 16th, WHIDBEY ISLAND hosted RADM "Woody" Sutton, Commander Amphibious Group TWO, and BGEN Robert M. Flanagan, Deputy Commander II MEF, for a tour of the ship.

Prior to returning homeport on August 19th, WHIDBEY ISLAND conducted an early morning underway replenishment for fuel with the USNS KANAWHA (TAO 196).

The morning of August 20th, WHIDBEY ISLAND was underway again to welcome more than 200 family members and friends aboard for a Dependent's Cruise. WHIDBEY ISLAND displayed several capabilities including MH-53 helicopter landings, weapons display, and LCAC demonstrations before returning to port in the evening.

To conclude a very busy month, WHIDBEY ISLAND began its leave and standdown period prior to its six-month deployment in September.

SEPTEMBER 1999

As the month of September began inport NAB Little Creek, the crew was enjoying the second half of Preparation for Overseas Movement (POM) prior to WHIDBEY ISLAND's six-month Mediterranean Deployment.

September 2nd, WHIDBEY ISLAND held additional pre-deployment briefs informing the crew and their family members what to expect during the ship's deployment.

The crew returned aboard September 13th, only to realize the ship had been placed on standby to get underway early for Hurricane Floyd.

To avoid Hurricane Floyd, the ship was ordered underway on September 15th. Once underway, WHIDBEY ISLAND spent the next three days in the Atlantic avoiding the hurricane and then proceeded directly to Onslow Beach to embark 22 MEU for deployment, effectively starting deployment two days early.

Due to hurricane damage at Morehead City, WHIDBEY ISLAND onloaded all Marines and equipment "over-the-beach" in less than 8 hours.

Following the onload, WHIDBEY ISLAND commenced the transatlantic crossing with BATAAN and SHREVEPORT.

WHIDBEY ISLAND rendezvoused with USNS PATUXENT (TAO 201) on September 17th for underway replenishments and BIG HORN on September 21st.

At the end of September, WHIDBEY ISLAND was still in transit to Rota, Spain for turnover with the KEARSARGE ARG.

OCTOBER 1999

Numerous training exercises, mostly related with Exercise Bright Star, kept WHIDBEY ISLAND Sailors and Marines busy for the first month of deployment.

October began with WHIDBEY ISLAND at anchor in Rota, Spain for turnover with the KEARSARGE ARG. CDR Ray L. Clark, Jr., Commanding Officer visited the BATAAN prior to the BATAAN ARG change of operational control to the Sixth Fleet.

WHIDBEY ISLAND weighed anchor the following morning en route its first Mediterranean liberty port, Alicante, Spain, on October 3rd. While in Alicante, the Commanding Officer made official calls on Luis Diaz Alperi, Mayor of Alicante, and Capitan de Navio Sancho Alvarez Ordonez, Alicante Port Captain. October 5th the wardroom was invited to a social with the Navy League Levante Council. On the 8th, the wardroom reciprocated by hosting 22 Levante Council members aboard for lunch, a tour of the ship, and demonstration of embarked Marine equipment. During the port call, WHIDBEY ISLAND triumphed in a soccer game against the Alicante Police, a basketball game against local Spanish Army team and participated in two tours: a sightseeing and shopping tour of Valencia and a medieval feast and war fighting festival. Castillo de Santa Barbara, located on a mountain overlooking Alicante, was a popular destination for Sailors and Marines. Also during the port call, WHIDBEY ISLAND sponsored a shipboard "Field Trip" for more than 30 disadvantaged children from Nazaret School.

WHIDBEY ISLAND departed Alicante October 9th. The ship rendezvoused on October 10th with BATAAN and SHREVEPORT en route Alexandria, Egypt and Exercise Bright Star. WHIDBEY ISLAND made history and lived up to her motto "First in Her Class, First Always" with the first simultaneous connected replenishment for stores and fuel for an LSD 41 class ship on October 12th.

WHIDBEY ISLAND celebrated the U. S. Navy's 224th birthday on October 13th. In honor of the occasion, the Food Service Division prepared a special birthday meal and cake for the crew. As tradition dictates, the youngest and oldest sailors, SN and SKC(SW) and SKC(SW), cut the birthday cake. The same day the Executive Officer, First Lieutenant, Operations Officer, and Communications Officer attended a Bright Star brief aboard BATAAN. An Air Operations brief followed on October 15th aboard HMS FEARLESS (L 10).

WHIDBEY ISLAND officially entered into Exercise Bright Star on October 16th and spent most of the remaining month in Victory Amphibious Operating Area (AOA) 40 miles west of Alexandria, Egypt. On October 18th, WHIDBEY ISLAND's 15 AAVs and two LCACs touched down on the Egyptian coast for an offload of Marines and equipment.

On October 19th forty representatives from British, Egyptian, and Dutch militaries arrived for cross-training during which a British Landing Craft Utility (LCU) maneuvered into WHIDBEY ISLAND's well for compatibility trials. Also, the Egyptian Naval Liason Officer, LT Wael Gemei arrived to assist in minimizing operational conflicts with Egyptian forces and for two weeks of cross-training. Daily launches and recoveries of LCACs and AAVs continued through October 21st in preparation for the Amphibious Assault Demonstration on the 22nd.

October 23rd, ADM James Kilgour, Commander of the Bright Star Coalition, visited WHIDBEY ISLAND and extended a 'Bravo Zulu' to personnel involved in the demonstration for their hard work. The Amphibious Demonstration was coordinated with the United Kingdom/Netherlands Amphibious Group (UKNLPHIBGRU) Staff by the Executive Officer, LCDR T. J. Lafferty. LCDR Lafferty was introduced to the Secretary of Defense (SECDEF), William S. Cohen, and Gen Anthony C. Zinni, Commander, Central Command (CENTCOM). The crew's morale was noticeably bolstered by the delivery of more than 2,800 pounds of mail after more than two weeks without word from home. Later that day, the ship weighed anchor to rendezvous with USS SEATTLE (AOE 3) for replenishment at sea before heading to Alexandria, Egypt.

On the 24th, WHIDBEY ISLAND moored in Alexandria for Amphibious Affiliation Training with the Egyptian Navy. WHIDBEY ISLAND returned to sea and the Victory AOA the same day.

As training exercises continued, crewmembers received a well-deserved treat when Her Majesty's Royal Marine Band came aboard to entertain troops with a concert on the flight deck October 28th. After nearly two hours of Sinatra favorites, Beatles' tunes, and Souza marches, the CO thanked the band for their performance and welcomed them aboard for their one-night stay.

Saturday, October 30th, the crew relaxed with a Steel Beach Picnic. On October 31st, CDR Clark gave the crew and additional day of holiday routine while Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) supplied popcorn and big-screen movies on the Turntable.

Three reenlistments occurred during the month of October: DCCS(SW/AW)

BM2(SW) and ET2 who who re-enlisted above the 39th Parallel and received his selective re-enlistment bonus (SRB) tax-free.

NOVEMBER 1999

November began with WHIDBEY ISLAND's continued participation in Exercise Bright Star. On November 2nd, CDR Ray L. Clark, Jr., Commanding Officer, welcomed aboard Combat Camera. The film crew spent a majority of the morning and early afternoon filming three separate projects: a "Go, Navy...Beat Army!" skit to be aired during the Army-Navy football game, interviews with members of the crew about their participation in Exercise Bright Star, and holiday greetings of individual Sailors and Marines to their family and friends back home. After the film crew completed taping, WHIDBEY ISLAND weighed anchor en route Antalya, Turkey

WHIDBEY ISLAND conducted an underway replenishment with USNS JOHN LENTHAL (TAO 189) November 4th and moored in Antalya, Turkey the following day. In Antalya, many crewmembers took advantage of a white water rafting tour and enjoyed the famous shopping Turkey had to offer. Crewmembers also participated in recreational activities such as soccer and basketball. Also moored in Antalya were the German ship, FGS EMDEN (F 210), and British ship, FEARLESS. Sailors from both ships toured WHIDBEY ISLAND, met their counterparts, and exchanged ball caps. Another visitor to WHIDBEY ISLAND was SIXTH Fleet Chaplain, CDR Rabbi traveled with WHIDBEY ISLAND to the next port, Haifa, Israel.

November 8th, WHIDBEY ISLAND welcomed CDR Brian E. Barrington, Prospective Commanding Officer (PCO) and the wardroom hosted a reception for FEARLESS' officers. November 9th, the crew enjoyed its last day in Antalya after making preparations for departure the following morning.

Late in the evening of November 9th, ENS Brandon C. Mahone, Electronic Materiel Officer, fell from a cliff resulting in serious injuries and, ultimately, his death. ENS Mahone was trying to aid LCpl who had fallen over an adjacent wall. After a short hospitalization for minor injuries, LCpl returned to the ship. SN and FN received Navy/Marine Corps Achievement Medals for their quick action in rendering assistance to LCpl and ENS Mahone.

On the evening of November 12th, Sailors and Marines gathered together to pay final respects to shipmate and friend, ENS Brandon C. Mahone. At the memorial service, ENS Mahone's roommate, ENS delivered the eulogy and remembered his friend as dedicated

husband, brother, and officer. CDR Clark, CDR _____, LT _____ (Chaplain embarked with Marines), LTJG _____ and ETSN _____ also spoke during the memorial service.

WHIDBEY ISLAND departed Antalya, Turkey November 10th to rendezvous with SHREVEPORT for transit to Haifa. On Veteran's Day, stores and fuel were provided by USNS CONCORD (AFS 5) and JOHN LENTHAL.

Upon reaching Haifa, Israel November 13th, the crew offloaded Marine equipment and vehicles. Training exercises began for the Marines the next morning and continued through November 24th. Since all three ships from the BATAAN Amphibious ARG moored in the same port, Haifa presented a special opportunity for crewmembers to visit friends and even family members aboard BATAAN and. SHREVEPORT

The USO set-up tours to Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Dead Sea and Massada. Many Christian sites in Jerusalem were closed November 16th in protest to new Muslim construction in the area, so some travelers were disappointed. However, those traveling to Massada enjoyed the afternoon walking through the ancient site and effortless floating in the Dead Sea where bathers rolled in mud baths to protect their skin from the high mineral content. The USO also arranged for interested crewmembers to spend an evening and a meal with local families.

CDR Brian E. Barrington took command of WHIDBEY ISLAND from CDR Ray L. Clark, Jr. on November 17th. Guest speaker, Commander Task Force SIX ONE/Commander Amphibious Squadron SIX, Commodore Stephen C. Jasper praised CDR Clark for his leadership of WHIDBEY ISLAND and presented him the Meritorious Service Medal for outstanding performance as Commanding Officer.

In his farewell speech, CDR Clark thanked Sailors and Marines for their dedication and loyalty. Concluding the ceremony, CDR Barrington expressed his honor and excitement to assume command of the WHIDBEY ISLAND. Guests for the ceremony included Col Walter Gaskin, Commander Task Force SIX TWO/Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) 22, CAPT David Taylor and CAPT Lee Hackney, Commanding Officer and Executive Officer of BATAAN; CAPT Ned Herbert, Commanding Officer of SHREVEPORT; and CDR Peter Grausse, Commanding Officer of USS UNDERWOOD (FFG 36).

November 18th, CDR Barrington began his first full day as Commanding Officer conducting material checks, walking through spaces, and familiarizing the crew with his command philosophy and policies.

Many WHIDBEY ISLAND Sailors attended a Joan Jett and the Blackhearts USO-sponsored concert pierside BATAAN November 22nd.

VADM Daniel J. Murphy, Jr., COMSIXTHFLT, visited WHIDBEY ISLAND November 23rd. During his address to the crew, VADM Murphy urged service members to be proud of the job they were accomplishing in the Mediterranean and to write their congressmen and women more often about issues facing the Navy today.

The Marines returned from exercises November 24th in time to enjoy Thanksgiving. A picnic was held on the pier in the afternoon and a traditional turkey dinner was served that evening. Since November is Native American Heritage Month, CDR Barrington asked DKC , a Jicarilla Apache, to carve the turkey. Some Sailors and Marines skipped dinner aboard, and instead spent the holiday with the children of AHAVA Village for Children.

After a thorough washdown, Marine vehicles and equipment were backloaded Friday, November 26th. Simultaneously, the ship made preparations for the Under Secretary of the Navy, the Honorable Jerry M. Hultin, to visit WHIDBEY ISLAND on November 27th. Mr. Hultin began his visit touring the ship and concluded his stay by addressing Sailors and Marines assembled on the flight deck. The Under Secretary emphasized that increasingly the Navy and Marine Corps would be the "first response" to global issues. He went on to discuss his policy of the "Three E's:" an ENGAGED Navy and Marine Corps around the world, an Internet system of E-COMMERCE useful for today's deployed fighting forces, and ways to 'END Inefficiency' by helping ships run smarter not harder. After his speech, Mr. Hultin invited questions from crewmembers concerning such issues as military housing, pending pay increases, personnel shortage problems, and the Internet's affect on the Navy's future.

WHIDBEY ISLAND departed Haifa on November 28th en route Palermo, Sicily. Several members of the crew received a special surprise November 29th as Joe Flanagan and Kevin Johnson, WVEC Norfolk Channel 13 Feature Reporter and Photojournalist, arrived to deliver early Christmas presents to select Sailors from their family members. Mr. Flanagan and his assistant filmed the Sailors opening their presents to be shown as part of an hour-long Christmas special airing December 24th and 25th on WVEC-Channel 13 in Hampton Roads.

On the final day of the month, WHIDBEY ISLAND crossed-over the 39th Parallel in the Northern Ionian Sea. Although considered a hazardous duty zone, most members of the crew looked forward to the crossing as it entitled them to tax-free pay for the month of November and free postage for personal mail.

DECEMBER 1999

Starting the month off on a positive note, YN1(SW) HM1(SW) HM1(SW) were reenlisted by the Executive Officer, LCDR T. J. Lafferty, December 1st. Because their reenlistments took place before WHIDBEY ISLAND transited south of the 39th Parallel in the North Ionian Sea, the sailors were entitled to tax-free reenlistment bonuses and leave sell-back. Numerous training exercises, such as General Quarters and helicopter crash/mass casualty drills, ran throughout the day to keep crewmembers' emergency skills sharp.

WHIDBEY ISLAND was the first ARG ship to transit the Strait of Messina on December 2nd en route Palermo, Sicily.

WHIDBEY ISLAND arrived in Palermo on December 3rd. After an awards ceremony on the flight deck, CDR Brian E. Barrington, Commanding Officer, addressed all personnel E-5 and below at Captain's Call to discuss the current deployment and future activities of the ship upon return to NAB Little Creek. CDR Barrington also answered questions from the crew concerning leave, upcoming schools, and future deployments.

Palermo was a pleasant liberty call for WHIDBEY ISLAND's Sailors and Marines. Besides the delicious Italian cuisine, the crew enjoyed local sites to include the cathedrals, palazzos, and the catacombs. Two of the more interesting cathedrals were the Palentine Chapel and the Church of San Giovanni.

Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) provided transportation by bus to Naval Air Station Sigonella. Even though the bus ride to the base was a three-hour drive each way, many members of the crew took the trip for the opportunity to shop at Navy Exchange or Uniform Store and eat at Subway or Burger King.

WHIDBEY ISLAND departed Palermo and transited the Strait of Messina for the second time December 9th. On December 10th, WHIDBEY ISLAND rendezvoused with JOHN LENTHAL for underway replenishment.

While en route the Adriatic Sea, stores for the ship were obtained by vertical replenishment from the CONCORD December 11th. The crew experienced the first winter weather of the deployment with cold winds and even a few short-lived snow flurries during the vertical

replenishment. Later the same day, weapons qualification was conducted on the 25mm, .50 cal, and M60 weapons.

WHIDBEY ISLAND arrived at the Adriatic Sea on the afternoon of December 13th. Although scheduled, all LCAC operations were cancelled during WHIDBEY ISLAND's time in the Adriatic due to rough seas and foul weather. However, other training evolutions were conducted such as Junior Officer ship handling, master helmsman training, loss of steering drills, and man overboard drills.

December 14th Lt Gen Peter Pace, Commander, U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Atlantic and BGen James F. Amos, Deputy Commander of Strike Force South were flown aboard to address Marine troops.

December 15th marked the halfway point for WHIDBEY ISLAND's deployment. In celebration of the occasion, the crew dined on Alaskan snow crab legs, roast beef, and Beef Wellington. CDR Barrington cut and served the first slice of "half-way home" cake at an ice cream social held after dinner.

December 18th, WHIDBEY ISLAND rendezvoused with JOHN LENTHAL for underway replenishment of fuel. Later that evening, the ship once again transited the Strait of Messina for the third time en route Genoa, Italy.

After firearm familiarization courses were completed, a firing range was set up on the flight deck for 9mm qualifications December 19th and 20th. WHIDBEY ISLAND arrived in Genoa, Italy on December 21st for its holiday port visit. Those members of the crew whose families flew from the states to join them during the holidays were able to enjoy a few days of leave. Other Sailors and Marines took one-day tours sponsored by MWR to sightsee in Florence and Pisa or ski in the Alps.

Christmas Day, the Mess Specialists provided another elaborate meal for those spending the holiday aboard with roast beef, turkey, ham, shrimp cocktail, and an assortment of desserts.

MWR sponsored a New Year's Eve celebration on the turntable with non-alcoholic champagne, a buffet of appetizers, music, videos, and party favors, so the crew of WHIDBEY ISLAND could ring in the millennium together.

Contrary to predictions of a "Y2K Crisis" on New Year's Eve, midnight came and went peacefully for WHIDBEY ISLAND.
